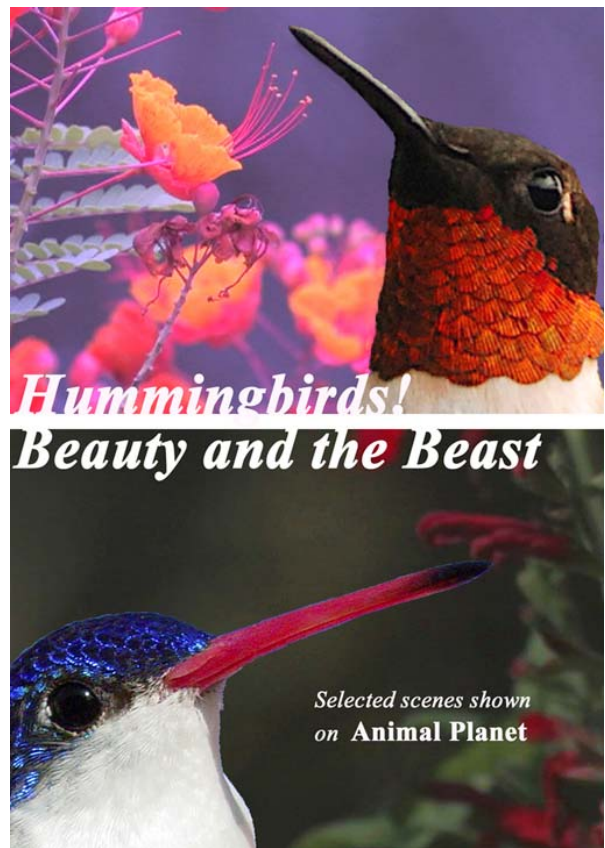
**Tom Kaminski's Latest DVD Just Released:
Hummingbirds! Beauty and the Beast**

Many may recall that Tom Kaminski has previously presented two programs to our chapter: "Hooked on Hummingbirds" and "Hooked on Galapagos Birds." Now he has just released a new DVD called "Hummingbirds! Beauty and the Beast", some scenes of which were shown on "Animal Planet". It shows 57 hummer species -- including all 16 that breed in the US -- plus 13 other bird species (including the 3-wattled Bellbird).

This program provides a new perspective on the hummingbird and sets the stage with the opening statement: "It's a great story, but it just isn't true that hummingbird beauty is more than feather deep ...[T]hey are little beasts that live by the law of the jungle." It goes on to portray them as single moms, deadbeat dads and teenage chicks, then moves to subjects such as the rules of competitive engagement; what hummingbirds want and how they get it; their incredible water management and other capabilities; flower mites they ferry in their nostrils; and other topics.

Tom just returned from Isla Robinson Crusoe, a Chilean possession 435 miles off the coast, where The Hummingbird Society sponsored him to film the endemic and critically endangered Juan

Fernandez Firecrown hummingbird. The call of the male Firecrown would strike terror into the hearts of any hummer found in the US. And the male and female are so different in size and color that, for many years, it was thought they were two different species. Firecrown "bonus material" will be included in the evening's program.

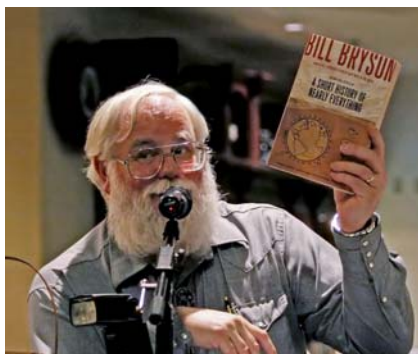

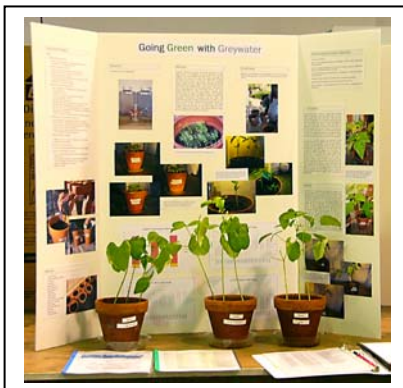
CVAS Dinner & Auction by *Charlie Lucas*

CVAS Annual Elliot McClure Award Presented At Ventura County Science Fair, 2009 by *Linda Reynolds*

The annual Ventura County Science Fair was held at Ventura County Fairgrounds on March 25, 2009, with awards given the following evening. Chrystal Klabunde and Linda Reynolds had their work cut out for them this year as there were many excellent entries, especially in the Environmental Sciences and Management category.

Alicia Sadowski, Pinecrest School, Thousand Oaks, was a winner with her entry entitled "Going Green with Greywater". Using seeds of foxgloves, marigolds, and beans, Alicia found that plants grow better in most cases using the greywater from an eco-friendly detergent. Her other two greywaters were tap water and Tide detergent.

Amanda Forest, Simi Elementary School, Simi Valley, impressed the judges with her experiment "Bye, Bye Red Ants". She explained that after an ant invasion in their home, she wanted to find a repellent that was non-toxic. Her trials used sandpaper, salt, baby powder, and cinnamon as potential solutions. Cinnamon was the most effective.

Linda and Chrystal were looking for proper scientific procedure, and a good visual presentation following state standards. After speaking with both of the girls, they determined Alicia and Amanda had indeed done their own work and write-up, and used topics which could easily be adapted by many people to their own home situations.

Nobuko McClure accompanied Linda to the awards ceremony, where both girls happily accepted the Conejo Valley Audubon Society's annual Elliot McClure awards of a plaque and \$100 each. It was the first Science Fair attempt for both of them!
